1. Introduction

Members were welcomed to the meeting and thanked for attending despite severe travel disruption. Apologies were made for those unable to attend.

2. Update on Nationally Contracted Products and CET

- 2.1 Ian White gave an update on the Nationally Contracted Products (NCP) workstream within the Carter programme.
 - NCP is one of eight workstreams, and each has been allocated two leads from within the NHS. The NCP leads are Gary Welch and Andy McMinn, both are heads of procurement.
 - The first products to be launched under the NCP programme are Couch Rolls, which are anticipated to deliver a 16% savings figures (£940k). The next will be blunt fill drawing up devices, which should deliver a 28% saving (£1.1m).
- 2.2 Ian discussed the new National Procurement Forum (NPF), which is formed from one representative from each STP procurement area. The initial engagement had highlighted that there is scope for improved communication across different trusts and sharing best practice.

Minutes of last meeting – 13th January 2017 4.

The minutes were agreed as a true record. The Chair explained that a summary of actions had been produced and that the majority had been worked on and closed since the last meeting, updates were provided to members.

5. Progress with Clinical Reference Board workplan; key priorities

5.1 Ambulance Service – Acute Sector standardisation project

Sandy Brown shared a comprehensive set of documents in the pre-read pack. He asked for thanks to be passed to Sally Fenwick for her strong support and acknowledged the wider support received from James Greaney at the NHSBSA and others.

Key points:

- MOUs have been signed to cross charge for electrode usage and there are links to the CET work, being led by Marc Naughton which will be published in June 2017.
- The aim is to identify one single product specification that can be used across acute and ambulance trusts.
- The electrodes study should be available for sharing by the end of May 2017 at which time the savings figure for the first three groups will be available and will most significantly be shown in the reduction in acute usage of electrodes, which translates into volume reduction savings

6.2 Summary of recent engagement with nursing community and active networks Update provided by Rose Gallagher.

- Small changes, big differences project update Three dates have been set for clinical procurement events to support the project (two in London at the RCN, and one in Sheffield). An email has been sent to each of the regional procurement networks for registration of their interest in procurement of continence products.
- RCN have developed a closed Facebook group for clinical nurse procurement network for those who use social media.
- New website pages have been completed and will be uploaded soon. The old RCN website will be archived at the end of March and the new site will be launched.
- The RCN will be visiting two GS1 sites to learn about its implementation from a nurse user point of view. They will visit Derby at thend of March and Plymouth at the end of April.

6.3 **Clinical maturity matrix**

The clinical procurement nurse network matrix has identified where specialist procurement nurse activity takes place within a trust and is a good source of information for national programmes to ensure that communications include this critical stakeholder group.

6.4 GS1 activity

- Suzanne Hinchcliffe gave an update on the GS1 activity in Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust. A £800k saving has been declared so far realised through stock reduction and in clinical activity such as tray changes and sterilization processes.
- The trust is looking at how the Scan4Safety logo will be used, as well as locations for GLNs. The Trust has tested 25k locations within the organisation and many have been tested on wards with a view to expanding into other clinical areas.
- Phase 1 & 2 have been delivered compliantly and within budget.

7. NHS Clinical Evaluation Team (CET)

Members were provided with an update on CET progress.

- Two woundcare reports have been issued for Film Island Dressings & Gelling Fibre products.
- There have been some delays in issuing reports, mostly caused by challenges from the supplier base.
- The CET has increased the transparency of their process to support suppliers in their understanding of the testing criteria by publishing their process and test criteria on the website. They also share their findings with suppliers prior to publication of the report.
